Chairman's Corner - Emergency Management

As your local government, Bushkill Township is charged with the preparedness, planning and response to any emergency or disaster that occurs in our township. Based on the extent of the emergency or disaster, we may be eligible to receive federal or state funds along with logistical assistance from Northampton County. But the front-line responsibility for emergency preparedness and response rests with your local government.

To meet that responsibility, your Board of Supervisors has put in place an Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) specifically for Bushkill Township. This plan details the structure of how the township organizes and responds during an emergency and defines the roles played by township officials & employees. The plan provides for the appointment of an Emergency Management Coordinator (EMC) to oversee the planning and response for emergencies on behalf of the Board. This position is currently held by Tom Barnowski, who assisted in the preparation of this article.

In the event of an emergency, the EMC can call for the establishment of our Emergency Operations Center, or EOC. Once in place, the EOC functions as our center to allow for the coordination of our response to the emergency. The EMC will generally call for the Chairman of the Board and the Township Manager to be present at the EOC to keep the government leaders apprised of the details of the emergency and how we are responding to it. The EOC has been activated for emergencies such as Super Storm Sandy to coordinate our response and provide resource coordination for our first responders.

Our first responders consist of our Police Department, Fire Company, and Public Works Department. These responders are dispatched immediately to any emergencies in the Township. If additional resources are needed because of the size of the incident, our EMC can call for assistance from the County, who can request additional resources from our state and federal governments. Please know that while our township forces are dispatched immediately along with any mutual aid resources from surrounding municipalities to service immediate needs, the request and dispatch of state and federal resources takes additional time.

The first personnel on the scene of any township emergency are usually members of our Police Department. These men and women are led by Chief Michael McLouth and his team of command officers. They are able to deal with any law enforcement emergency, as well as administering any first aid needed until the arrival of paramedics. They also assist, as needed, with any manpower shortages at the scene of any emergency. Our officers have always offered help in any way that they can.

The emergency responders include our Township Fire Company. The firefighters and emergency responders are led by Fire Chief Brian Stahl and his command team. They respond to all aspects of the emergencies including fighting fires, providing rescue service and removing fallen trees from roadways. The Fire Company also operates the emergency medical services that provide the ambulances and paramedic response.

The Public Works Dept, under the director of Foreman Pete Yotter, is also mobilized during times of emergency to handle any aspect of the emergency involving our highways and public areas. They are equipped for snow removal, removing fallen trees, closing roads that are deemed unpassable, opening culverts that may be blocked and causing flooding, and helping with any aspect of the emergency.

As you can tell from the information shared, your local government is prepared to respond as needed to any emergency or disaster that occurs in our township. But based on the extent of the emergency or disaster, there may be challenges that will require additional resources and the efforts of outside responders. While the Township is on the front line, it cannot be emphasized enough that local emergency preparedness begins with the individual resident. Lock it or Lose it: As the warm weather approaches, we would like to remind everyone to continue to practice crime prevention techniques to deter criminal activity. Many property crimes can be prevented with some simple, common sense actions on the part of all of us.

Here are a few crime prevention tips to help keep us from becoming the victim of a burglary or theft:

- Remember to always secure your car doors when parking your vehicle, even for just a few minutes. It takes just a matter of seconds to enter an unsecured vehicle.
- Do not leave valuables, such as purses, cell phones, laptops, packages, etc. in plain view inside your vehicle. Secure them in a glove box, center console, or even better in the trunk. Thieves will search other vehicles that are easier targets if they do not see anything of value in your car.
- Park in well lighted areas at night. Light is an enemy of thieves.
- Keep your garage door closed and locked at night. Many burglaries to garages occur with doors left wide open. An open garage door is an invitation to a thief to take anything in sight.
- Be suspicious of anyone approaching your vehicle or roaming your neighborhood.
- Always lock your doors when doing yard work, getting mail, or anytime you go outside-both front and back doors. With the warmer weather we tend to leave windows and doors open so be extra diligent during this season.
- Criminals pose as repairman, claim to have lost a pet, fence company or driveway paving company. Many times they have someone occupy you and then the accomplice enter the house from another open door and take whatever valuables they can find while you are attending to the person at the door.
- Never allow strangers in your house, even if they appear to be in distress or with a young child.



Slow Down: Speeding is a complaint the police department commonly receives from residents. Along with these complaints, we are often asked questions about “how are speed limits determined” and “can the speed limit be changed.”

First, it is important to know that responsibility for the roads in Bushkill Township is divided among three agencies; Bushkill Township for local roads; Northampton County Bridges, and the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT) for all state roads such as East/West Moorestown Rd, Cherryhill Rd, and Jacobsburg Rd. The agency responsible for the road is the one who is responsible for its speed limit. Enforcement of the laws on the roads, however, is the responsibility of the Bushkill Township Police Department.



How are speed limits determined? Speed limits are not arbitrarily decided. They are established by federal, state and local laws, which take in to consideration the function, design and usage of the road. Is the road intended for heavy commuter traffic or light local traffic? How wide are the lanes? How wide are the shoulders? Is it straight or winding? Are there a lot of intersections? Is the area residential, industrial, urban or country?

Agencies will also conduct a traffic study to determine how many vehicles travel on the road and how fast they are driving. From this study, a statistic called the “85th percentile speed” is obtained. The 85th percentile is the speed at which 85% of the vehicles are traveling. The speed limit of a road should be set within +/- five miles per hour of the 85th percentile.

Can the speed limit be lowered to slow people down? Yes and no. Municipalities do have some discretion to adjust speed limits, but studies must be done and any change must comply with the law. The Police Department is aware of the complaints from our residents and officers regularly conduct presence and enforcement details in those areas. Based on our observations from these details, we have found a majority of the violations we find are being committed by the residents of the neighborhood itself. Sometimes a simple neighborhood awareness program and communication with your neighbors is an effective way to address the problem.

Nazareth Soccer Club's Next 25 Years

The Nazareth Soccer Club celebrated its 25th Anniversary in 2019, serving more than 1,200 young registrants on more than 100 teams throughout the year. We were launched in 1994 by local families and reached only 40 players in that initial year. We have grown into a bedrock youth service agency in the community. The Club is led by an all-volunteer Board that includes three Township residents: Todd Wismer, our Fields Director, Brian Ransom, our long-time Secretary, and Karen Janis, our longer-time Communications Director.

We could not have come this far without the help of Bushkill Township's Supervisors and residents. We are grateful for your ongoing support. Not only has the Township granted our players access to its recreational fields each fall, but the Club and Township jointly established Lucas Lane Fields about 12-13 years ago. The Township's support, including free access to its Municipal Conference Room for our monthly Board meetings, helps us keep our costs low.

When our costs stay low, we can offer low-cost playing experiences for all local kids. We haven't raised registration fees in five years, and we've recently established a fee-waiver fund for low-income families, along with a small scholarship program for graduating Nazareth Area High School seniors who played in the Club. We could not have done this without your support.



As we move into 2020, our first priority is to locate and secure additional field space. If you know anyone with a field they could loan or donate to the Club, please let us know. We want to keep all our fields – provided free-of-charge to us by your Township Supervisors, Nazareth Borough, and Upper Nazareth – in good, safe condition for young players, and that means we need enough fields that we can rest some each season after months of heavy in-season cleat traffic.

Our second priority is identifying additional volunteers. Especially if you are retired and want to help serve the community, or if your son or daughter needs to earn community service hours, the Nazareth Soccer Club is a fun, positive way to help local kids grow in skill, fitness and character. It's all about the kids.

ROAD WORK — Please keep a lookout for our Public Works department working on roads this spring and summer. For safety reasons, please respect all signs directing traffic and closing roads. Please do not attempt to drive around the road work if the road is closed.

YARD WASTE — All Bushkill Township residents can drop off yard waste at our local collection facility at 897 Clearfield Road. A free permit is required and can be obtained at the Township Office during regular business hours. For safety and security, the township buildings & collection facility are under surveillance 24/7. All commercial businesses and contractors must drop off at the Central Processing Center at 6701 Weaversville Road, PA 18067 (in East Allen Township). All grass clippings must be taken to the Central Processing Center, as they cannot be accepted at our local facility.

The local facility can accept:

- Branches (no more than 4 inches in diameter/5 feet long)
- Leaves (loose or in brown bags designed for leaves)
- Christmas trees (free of tinsel, lights, and ornaments)
- Small brush, hedge trimmings, garden plant residue

The local facility cannot accept:

- Grass clippings
- Lumber
- Sod
- Large woody debris
- Plastic/other synthetic materials

Current Hours for local drop off are Monday thru Friday, 7:00am to 3:00pm and Saturdays 8:00am to 12:00pm. Please call the Township or check the website for seasonal, updated hours. For hours for the First Regional Compost Authority (FRCA), please contact their office at the number below.

The 2020 Census is coming soon!

Every 10 years, the federal government conducts a population count, or census, of everyone in the United States. Data from this census provides the basis for distributing more than \$675 billion in federal funds, annually, to communities across the country to support vital programs — including housing, education, transportation, employment, health care, and public policy. In addition, it can also effect the number of representatives in our state and federal governments.

The information gathered through the questions in the census gives our local school districts, local governments, businesses, and policymakers in state and federal governments the information they need to make important decisions. These decisions may include: where to build schools, roads, and hospitals; where to build new stores and businesses; what products and services are needed in our area; and even what new policies or public programs would be helpful to our community.

You should receive your first mailing from the U.S. Census Bureau in late-March 2020/early April. We ask that all of our residents reply to the census questionnaire, either in writing or online, for the good of our community!

Building a Better Pennsylvania in 2020

The second half of the 2019-20 Legislative Session is officially underway, and I couldn't be more excited to get back to work for the people of the 138th District. Many of the priorities we are taking on during this session are extensions of our efforts from last year. These include measures taken to grow our agriculture, help our first responders, improve our fiscal responsibility, take the lead in job creation, reform the criminal justice system and more.

Here are a few of the highlights from last year:

Growing PA Agriculture – Agriculture is our state's top industry and helps put food on our tables each and every day. To support the industry and the millions of people it employs, we passed a series of laws to help it grow and thrive well into the future. We in the legislature passed a comprehensive package of bills that will help Pennsylvania's agriculture industry grow and thrive, including:

- Increasing our state's overall investment in agriculture by \$19.5 million or 12.7%.

- Recognizing the importance of animal health, new line items devote \$2 million to the Animal Health and Diagnostic Commission and \$1 million to livestock and consumer health protection.

- Restoring funding for programs eliminated by the governor's proposal, including agricultural research; agricultural promotion, education and exports; hardwoods research and promotion; and the livestock and open dairy shows.

Helpers and Heroes – Recognizing the challenges facing the fire and emergency medical services we rely upon to protect our communities, we passed more than a dozen bills that encourage volunteerism, enhance access to training and provide more flexible funding options to emergency response organizations.

Government Done Right – Taxpayers deserve an effective and efficient government that focuses on providing core services. Earlier this year, we worked to improve our operations by repealing out-of-date laws, reexamining the effectiveness of some state boards and commissions, identifying opportunities to reduce costs and cutting red tape. We also passed the most significant reforms to our election process in decades.

School Property Tax Reform: Continuing the Fight

Legislative Update:

Senate Pro Tempore Calls for Property Tax Vote

As a member of the General Assembly, I have tirelessly fought for relief from the burdensome school property tax. As I continue this fight, I applaud Senate President Pro Tempore Joe Scarnati's recent call for a vote by the full Pennsylvania Senate on school property tax reform.

In an interview with online news outlet Capitolwire following his re-election to the Senate's top post, Scarnati said having a floor vote is warranted since many senators have spoken for years about wanting to take action to reform school property taxes.

Every week we are in the Capitol is another week that citizens in my district, especially our seniors, are suffocating under the weight of ever-increasing school property taxes. Many individuals have reached out to me to say that school property taxes should be eliminated for all – I agree with them. I would vote for full elimination tomorrow; however, to date, those proposals have not had the votes to pass.

I encourage those citizens who support full elimination to reach out to their senator or representative, especially if he or she is not a supporter, and urge their support.

I have introduced many legislative measures over my career in both the House and Senate. Most recently, I introduced Senate Bill 805 to provide the revenue necessary to eliminate school property taxes on owner-occupied homes via the homestead exclusion. This legislation followed the Constitutional Amendment question passed by voters in 2017 expanding the homestead exclusion to 100 percent of a home's assessed value.

In addition, I will be introducing legislation in the near future providing for much needed school property tax relief for senior citizens across the Commonwealth. The measure would provide for a property tax rebate of up to \$5,000 for all seniors age 65 and older who have an annual household income of less than \$60,000.

If I could single-handedly force change, I would. But it takes 26 senators, 102 representatives and the governor to pass any proposal. However, I am encouraged by Senator Scarnati's remarks in favor of a Senate vote on school property tax reform.

The Memorial Library of Nazareth and Vicinity faces a significant shortfall in the library's 2020 budget due to municipal funding cuts from both Upper Nazareth and Lower Nazareth Townships. After a long and careful review of options, the Library Board voted to reduce expenditures in several key areas of the library such as: staffing, technology, janitorial services, as well as in children and adult programs and services. Every cut will impact every person who uses the library, and will go into effect in March. For details, please click the link on our homepage (www.nazarethlibrary.org).

Even with this dramatic financial setback, the library strives to serve the community in traditional and contemporary ways. The library continues to be a hub for digital intelligence, civic engagement, and a space for people to meet, read, work, and play. The library is proud to continue to build community partnerships like those that we have with the Nazareth Business Council, Nazareth YMCA, Joshua Tree, Nazareth Rotary, AARP, St. Luke's University Health Network, the Nazareth Food Bank, Stone Soup, and many others. These partnerships, along with fully-funding municipalities (Bushkill Township & Nazareth Borough), make our goals more attainable.

The library is clearly at the core of the community as it hosted over 1,000 visitors during Christmas in Nazareth, the beloved community-wide event (this special day at the library included Santa Claus, NASME train display, Polar Express Engineer, crafts, food and refreshments). In January, the library hosted the Nazareth Business Council and fire chiefs from Vigilance Hose Co. #1 and Hecktown Fire Company for a community conversation on fire safety; in addition, the library also offered three educational programs led by experts in their fields: a résumé writing workshop facilitated by a Certified Professional Résumé Writer, an informative program on lower back pain, led by Dr. Katarina Schmidt; and an educational presentation on diabetes from St. Luke's University Health Network Health Network physicians. All program expenses were donated by the presenters, and are offered free of charge to our patrons.

As we look to the future, the library will continue to build our partnership with St. Luke's University Health Network as we offer programs focused on healthy living and wellness in 2020. We are also looking forward to programming facilitated by Joshua Tree on topics that will help the community learn about their lawn care needs and safe methods for tending to their yards. We are continuing our partnership with AARP in 2020 to offer free tax preparation through the month of March. Finally, the library is proud to host new teen programming in 2020, including events that will provide opportunities for teens to socialize and learn about the resources available at the library.



Hunter Access Program in Bushkill Township

New for the 2020-21 hunting season, Bushkill Township is entering into an agreement with the Pennsylvania Game Commission to enroll several Township-owned properties into the Commission's Hunter Access Program. This will be a pilot program for the Township, meaning that changes may be made as necessary from season to season. The Hunter Access Program creates a partnership between the Pennsylvania Game Commission and the enrolled landowner to provide safe and responsible public hunting opportunities. This Program benefits both hunters and landowners by increasing the amount of lands available for hunting, while managing the property's game population through hunting, sponsored habitat enhancements, and proper law enforcement by the Commission.

Enrollment in the Hunter Access Program means that the landowner is willing to provide reasonable access to their property for hunting, but the landowner retains their rights and ultimately governs actual use by hunters. This means that hunters must obtain landowner permission for access to hunt and that the type of hunting, game species, and other considerations are determined by the landowner. Hunters wishing to use properties owned by the Township must visit the Bushkill Township Municipal Building at 1114 Bushkill Center Road, Nazareth, PA 18064 to obtain permission and a permit to hunt on specific enrolled properties. To obtain a permit, the hunter must complete a brief application form and provide their valid hunting license, so the Township has a copy of their Customer Identification (CID) number. A permit will then be given to the hunter, along with maps and a rules and regulations document for the Township-owned properties that are enrolled in the Hunter Access Program. Please note that hunters may be denied a permit with legitimate reason. Hunting on a Township-owned property without a permit will be considered a trespass violation, enforceable by the Pennsylvania Game Commission, and will be subject to a fine. Hunting will only be allowed on Township-owned properties that are indicated on the maps provided at the Township Building. Bushkill Township will limit park properties to Archery only. Other Township owned properties will be Firearm/Archery. All restrictions on game species and Firearm/Archery restrictions will be outlined in the rules and regulations document given to each hunter. No tree stands, trail cameras, or other hunting equipment may be left over night or unattended for any reason. All tree stands must be of non-damaging design (to trees) and must be clearly marked with the hunter's CID number.

Currently, there are many tree stands on Township properties. If you know anyone who has a tree stand on Township property, please alert them to this new policy. Any tree stands not removed will be posted to remove by Sunday September 06, 2020, after which they will be removed by the Township.


